Adam Christie, Artist Extraordinaire

Adam Christie was born the son of a crofter in Cunningsburgh Shetland, and in his thirties he developed a degree of mental illness which necessitated his removal from Shetland to the Asylum at Sunnyside, Montrose.

Adam never returned to Shetland, and from 1901 until his death in 1950 the hospital was his home, and he was buried in a pauper's grave in Montrose.

For the remarkable story behind Adam Christie, we have to thank the late Dr Ken Keddie, who was a consultant psychiatrist at Sunnyside, and undertook a detailed piece of research on the life and times of this remarkable patient, and the book was called "The Gentle Shetlander."

Adam was remarkable in the sense that he had no formal artistic training, and he began to produce an amazing number of stone sculptures, using only an old file and a six inch nails as his carving tools. He was also a painter and poet, and made fiddles from old wooden tea chests.

The term "artist extraordinaire" was used to describe Adam, as his skills did not flourish in a formal artistic setting or training in these skills, yet his work was so admired that the Montrose sculptor William Lamb took him under his wing.

I had read the book, and in 2008 composed a song about this remarkable man, which has now just been re – released as a fund raising activity to erect a headstone to Adam Christie .

Little did I know that Adam Christie was again to feature in my work, and during the Father of the Bard project in 2009 I discovered that Adam Christie had sculpted the plaque to commemorate where Robert Burns had stopped at Hillside on his Highland Tour of 1787 and was one of the four men who contributed to the memorial.

A plaque was erected at Hillside last year, to commemorate this event and to ensure the story was never lost again.

An exhibition of Adam Christie's work is currently on display until the end of the month, and has brought together an amazing array of his artistic works.

Hosted and creatively displayed by Angus Council and Montrose Museum, the exhibition was promoted by the Howe o' the Mearns Heritage Association and generously sponsored by;

Rachel Benvie, Curator, Montrose Museum and her colleagues, have put together an amazing display of Adam's known collected works, and the exhibition called "For the Maker's Own Delight" captures the creativity and the life and times of Adam, and is an exhibition not to be missed by any heritage or local history group.


For an added Mearns connection, Helen Cruickshank, a well-known Angus poet, whose father was George Cruickshank and was Steward at the Asylum, provides a vivid account in the book the Gentle Shetlander, of how the patients worked on the Home Farm, and the wonderfully descriptive scenes of a harvest gathering.

George Cruickshank, born in 1845, came of farming stock near the village of Auchinblae, joined the hospital service as a young man, and was promoted to House Steward responsible for buying and storing all the commodities needed in the Asylum.


It is against the law to allow dogs to foul anywhere without cleaning up. It only takes seconds and the bags can be deposited in any bin.

Den Flood Repair Fund This appeal has now closed.

Sincere thanks to everyone who has contributed towards repairing damage wreaked on our Den during the night of 23rd December last. At the time we wondered how we could ever recover from the devastation. But recover we have, thanks to local help, both physical and financial, which is exactly what we asked for in our initial appeal back in March.

The piggy bank collection which David at the Old Post Office organised, has brought in £128.07. Thank you David for doing this and I believe some tips, meant for the staff were added, so thanks to them too.

Other sums received came from the following sources: Auchenblae Heritage Society £100; Bob Jamieson's DVD footage of the flood £140.00; the 'Mad Chicken Wifie's' sale of eggs £52.00; Clare's Phoenix card party £35.00 and three individual donations amounting to £410.00.

We also received a most unexpected donation of £200 from John Fraser who, it transpires, is the nephew of the late Bob Peattie! John, who lives in England, read about the damage through the online Messenger and decided he would like to give a contribution.

Thanks to the amazing work done before and during our Work Day, the Den now looks remarkably unscathed, but huge damage was done to the old dry stone walls which edge the burn, particularly between the old sluice gate at the dam and the pavilion. These areas will have to be shored up to prevent further erosion. A contractor with heavy plant is scheduled to come very soon to start on this, as well as further work upstream. The massive stones which are presently in the car park will be used in this operation.

Additionally, should we experience another flood on this scale, a mound will be built at the north end of the lade to create a water retention area, hopefully limiting damage downstream. SEPA and Scottish Flood Forum are aware of this plan. It should be stressed that this mound will not prevent access by pedestrians to the woodland walks.

P. S. Aberdeenshire Council has awarded financial aid to allow this work to proceed and a generous donation has been pledged by Macphie's of Glenbervie on completion of the project.

Visitors to the Den

This year has been especially busy with families from Aberdeen, Dundee and everywhere in between coming along with picnics and spending the whole day in the Den. It's good to see these children running around happily in a safe environment. However..... although we have signs up requesting donations towards upkeep, it's assumed by the majority that the Den is financed by the Council. As we all know, this is not the case, and a little donation towards upkeep, through the honesty boxes, would be most welcome.


