



And unbelievably, that's what some folk seem to forget to do, with the result that occasionally events take place, and when we mention them, we get a look of blank incomprehension because people weren't aware they were happening. And when we say, "But it was in the Messenger"we realise that not everything we write has been read! So don't miss out on what's going on, and we hope you will all continue to enjoy the *Messenger* and the *Memo* in 2004.

We were born before television, before penicillin, polio shots, frozen foods, Xerox, contact lenses, videos and the pill. We were born before radar, credit cards, split atoms, laser beams and ballpoint pens, before dish-washers, tumble-driers, electric blankets, air conditioners, drip-dry clothes....and before man walked on the moon.

We got married first and then lived together (how quaint can you be?). We thought 'fast food' was what you are in Lent. A 'Big Mac' was an oversized raincoat and 'crumpet' we had for tea. We existed before house-husbands, computer dating and 'sheltered accommodation' was where you waited for a bus.

We were born before day care centres, group homes and disposable nappies. We never heard of FM Radio, tape decks, artificial hearts, word processors, or young men wearing earrings. For us 'time sharing' meant togetherness, a 'chip' was a piece of wood or fried potato, 'hardware' meant nuts and bolts and 'software' wasn't a word.

Before 1940 'Made in Japan' meant junk, the term 'making out' referred to how you did in your exams, 'stud' was something that fastened a collar to a shirt, and 'going all the way' meant staying on a double-decker bus to the terminus. In our day cigarette smoking was 'fashionable', grass was mown, 'coke' was kept in the coal-house, a joint was a piece of meat you ate on Sundays, and 'pot' was something you cooked in. 'Rock Music' was a fond mother's lullaby, 'Eldorado' was ice-cream, a 'gay person' was the life and soul of the party, while 'aids' just meant beauty treatment or help for someone in trouble.

We who were born before 1940 must be a hardy bunch when you think of the way in which the world has changed and the adjustments we have had to make. No wonder there is a generation gap today. . BUT—by the grace of Godwe have survived!



AUCHENBLAE SURGERY

Continuing Improvements to the Surgery

Patients may have noticed that we have had CCTV cameras and security lighting fitted in the car park. We do appreciate that members of the public will use the car park from time to time outwith opening hours and in particular that there are some younger people who use the car park for skateboarding etc.

While we have no problems with this occurring, there have been several acts of vandalism in the past – undoubtedly the responsibility of a small minority of teenagers using the area. The money required to repair the vandalism is money that would otherwise have gone to improve services/equipment for all patients of the practice. Anyone using the car park outwith surgery hours should be mindful that the CCTV cameras are now operational 24 hours per day.

A section of the reception hatch has been lowered to improve access for wheelchair users, and there will be minor changes made to the disabled toilets.

There are now two new car parking spaces near to the front door of the surgery designated for use by disabled and less able patients. Handrails have been fitted to improve access to the surgery from these car parking spaces. We are less than happy with the appearance of the rails and are investigating how this could be improved. However, they undoubtedly make access to the surgery safer.

Now that we have increased the number of parking spaces there should be sufficient parking area within the car park at the rear of the surgery, and it would be appreciated if visitors to the surgery did not create danger for passing traffic by parking on the street.

3 The Messenger Website will be upgraded subject to agreement to allow easier navigation and to let non Techy People use it to publish the online version.






BROADBAND INTERNET ACCESS IN AUCHENBLAЕ

BT has set a trigger of 150 users on the Auchenblae exchange registering an interest but not actually ordering broadband to make it commercially viable to install ADSL facilities. The Auchenblae exchange includes all the numbers in Fordoun and the surrounding district.

As the graph below shows as of Saturday the 21st February 2004, there are 121 registered interests in the scheme. It is good news that 43 of these interests were in a four-week period from mid January 2004 to Mid February 2004. This is not unusual in exchanges nearing their trigger and it is hoped that March will be as productive




If this high level of interest is shown in the next month or two, the Auchenblae Exchange will hit the 150 trigger probably in April 2004 with BT likely producing a ready for service date usually some 5 months after the trigger is reached. This may well be in September going by the example of a number of exchanges shown on the www.adslguide.org.uk site.
